malt madness

Two days, 4 brackets, 11 judges and countless cups — how would a dozen Jersey beers fare in our field of 64?

PULSE-QUICKENING action. Edge-of-seat suspense. Dramatic come-from-behind victories. The NCAA men's or women's basketball tournament? No — Malt Madness!

Our hoppiest if not happier version of March Madness had its share of sudsy surprises and frantic finishes, as our esteemed judges worked their way through our field of 64 beers, bracketed in four styles — lagers/pilsners; pale ales/IPAs; wheats and whites; stouts and porters. There were few lopsided victories, with many of the matchups decided by one-vote margins. The judges took their duties seriously. Well, most of the time anyway.

"If this dog was in a pound," one judge said of Flying Dog Old Scratch Amber Lager, "I'd adopt it."

"Get your nose in there; experience the beer," another said of an entry in

the stout category.

Hey, get your nose out of our beer! "Do the readers know we worked really hard at this?" wondered judge Marcia Sheldon of Scotch Plains.

They'll have to take our word for it, Marcia. Jersey beers did reasonably well. Climax's Hoffmann Helles won the lager/pilsner division, while another Climax beer, Hoffmann Hefeweizen, knocked off Samuel Adams Hefeweizen and Magic Hat Circus Boy in the wheats/whites category before being edged by Victory Sunrise Weissbier.

Coney Island Steel Hop Lager — its sword swallower-themed label was the tournament's best — was a sudsy Cinderella, racing past Cricket Hill East Coast Lager and Yuengling Traditional Lager before being ousted by Hoffmann Helles.

Biggest first-round shocker: Stone

Imperial Russian Stout, winner of our Suds Sweet 16 last year, upset by Arcadia Imperial Stout, from that little-known hops heaven, Battle Creek, Mich.

Best name? Hoppin' Frog B.O.R.I.S. The Crusher Oatmeal Imperial Stout. B.O.R.I.S., alas, was crushed in the second round by Oskar Blues Ten Fidy, the porter/stout winner.

Brooklyn Brewery makes some fine beers, but it's barking up the wrong tree, or beer barrel. Flying Dog, which two judges rated as their favorite beer in the entire field, wins easily, 10-1. Let this dog out of the six-pack and enjoy.

Victory's Prima Pils was a first-round fizzle in lagers/pilsners, but its Sunrise Weissbier knocked off Southern Tier Heavy Weizen, Ramstein Blonde and Hoffmann Hefeweizen to advance to the finals.

It was a slam dunk, all right — for Allagash. "This is beer royalty," one judge said reverentially. The pale-yellow, citrusy, slightly spicy Allagash — the pride of Portland, Maine — marches on.

Judges admired Victory's "bite" and "strong flavor," but in the end Allagash played Louisville to Victory's Siena. Close until the final few minutes, with Allagash pulling away. Must be something in the water up there — Allagash won our SuperBeer Bowl, a matchup between New York/New Jersey and New England beers, a year ago.

A battle of literal heavy-weights. The tasty, toasty Sierra Nevada pours smooth, and will appeal to the porter-uninitiated. But Ten Fidy — looks like motor oil, tastes like a mega-malty chocolate milkshake/beer, sends the California porter packing. Resist the urge to pour it in your crankcase, and aim for your mouth instead. Marvelous.

The tournament director spent much of the competition seeing his favorite beers lose, and this was another example. Jah-Va, with its seductive chocolate/coffee, sweet/burnt flavors and overtones, is edged by the more mainstream Sierra Nevada. Malt Madness judging, unfortunately, is a democracy. Sierra Nevada moves on.

The Flash is mashed by the deep, dark, delicious Ten Fidy, from Colorado. Oskar Blues calls it "concupiscent," a play on concupiscent, which means vigorously passionate. You'll last over, or after, this beer.
